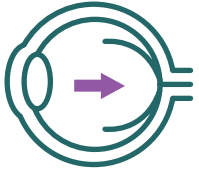


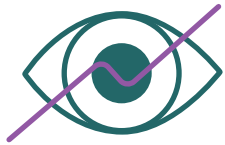
The Geographic Atrophy (GA) Journey Starts Here

Every GA journey is different, but knowing the basic facts can make GA less overwhelming



GA affects the retina—the part of the eye that allows you to see

Vision symptoms tend to get worse over time and the damage can't be reversed or corrected with glasses or surgery



GA Symptoms:



Straight lines appear crooked



Difficulty seeing in the dark



Hazy or blurred vision



Colors seem dull or washed out



Blurry spots



GA can lead to vision loss including a blurry spot in the center of your vision

Reading, driving, traveling, and ability to work may become difficult, especially in low light or darker places
